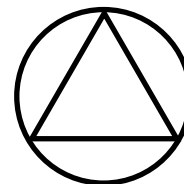

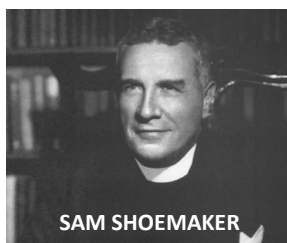

Sam Shoemaker, Clergyman and Friend of AA

Sam Shoemaker, was one of the earliest friends of AA, and became a friend of Bill W., even before Bill met Dr. Bob. They met before AA existed. How did that happen?

Let's take a glance at Sam Shoemaker himself first. He was born in 1884 to a wealthy family, had the finest of educations, and was a handsome, congenial, well-liked and well-respected man. Yet in 1918, while in Beijing, China, he knew that something was missing. After hearing and speaking with Frank Buchman, the founder of the Oxford Group, Sam realized what it was. Sam wanted to serve God, but on his own terms. When he surrendered to serving God unequivocally, his life dramatically changed, and his ability to inspire others expanded greatly. It also began a long-term friendship with Frank Buchman, and led Sam to go to seminary and become an Episcopal priest in 1921.¹

By 1934 the Rev. Dr. Shoemaker was rector of Calvary Episcopal Church in New York City, and chief publicist in the US for the Oxford Group.² While rector there Sam launched two projects that deeply affected AA. The first was Calvary House, begun in 1928, where Bill W, Lois and early AA members attended Oxford Group meetings. The second project was Calvary Mission, begun in 1926, on the lower east side., which operated as a rescue mission until 1936. Evangelism and sobriety were its main messages, and 200,000 homeless men visited there. Sam was also a deep believer in small group activities.³

As we know from the Big Book, Ebby T., an Oxford Group member, carried the message of hope to Bill, and Bill carried the message to Dr. Bob in Akron, also an Oxford Group member. The message of recovery for alcoholics then began to spread within the Oxford Group. In an earlier issue of the POST, the break between AA and the Oxford Group is detailed.

So what exactly was Sam Shoemaker's role in bringing the message of recovery to the still suffering alcoholics? As recorded in the *Grapevine*, Bill W. reported that: "On Thursday, October 31, 1963 Dr. Sam Shoemaker, the great Episcopal clergyman and first friend of AA, passed from our sight and hearing. He was one of those few without whose ministrations AA could never have been born in the first place--nor prospered since. From his teaching, Dr. Bob and I absorbed most of the principles that were later embodied in the Twelve Steps of AA. Our ideas of self-examination, acknowledgement of character defects, restitution for harms done and working with others came straight from Sam. Therefore, he gave to us the concrete knowledge of what we could do about our illness; he passed to us the spiritual keys by which so many of us have since been liberated. We who in AA's early time were privileged to fall under the spell of his inspiration can never be the same again. We shall bless Sam's memory forever."⁴

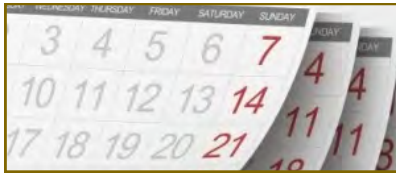

STEP 4

Made a searching and fearless moral inventory of ourselves.

STEP REFLECTIONS

The fourth step ... scary stuff. Especially on the wall when I had no understanding of it.

Thank goodness the steps are in order and I had a sponsor that walked me through the process and answered every question I had backed by her own experience.

We did the third step prayer together on our knees and then she instructed me to get a notebook and pen to start writing. She showed me the "picture in the big book" and shared with me people, institutions and principles that were on her list in order to give me real life examples. She told me to make my columns and get to writing. One thing she told me that I always try to share with the ladies I sponsor is pray

before I begin to write. Ask God to guide my pen. This is something I do every time I begin to write my experiences for the POST as well.

I put pen to paper and wrote down everything that came to mind as it related to my resentments, fears and sex conduct. I carried around post-it notes to jot things down as I remembered until I got home to put them in my notebook.

I remember hesitating as secrets came to mind, but by this time in my journey I wanted true freedom so on the paper they went.

When my lists were finished I let my sponsor know and we scheduled time for me to share what I had written. Little did I know the freedom that was about to come.

TRADITION FOUR

Each group should be autonomous except in matters affecting other groups or A.A. as a whole.

The traditions reflect AA's experience gained from historic processes both right and wrong. The traditions were formulated around the time of Dr. Bob's last days and he initially objected to them. Dr Bob's approach was personal guidance compared to Bill who wrote a book and wanted to mentor a large organization. This tradition addresses the challenge of a centralized 'head' office that still exists today.

As AA grew to different towns and countries groups were encouraged to consult with New York for advice in getting started and dealing with questions, should they arise. NY GSO became a seat of power and authority. Areas with large numbers of meetings created inter-groups that operated independently of the New York GSO to handle common services like

a phone service, news letter, meeting directories and etc. Some years latter as Bill was reaching the end of his life the NY GSO organization was formalized as the service legacy and its structure copied from the Los Angeles intergroup.

Local resources like personal, various services, and money are directed locally which frequently leaves the GSO starving. How do we get more money to NY GSO is an issue that comes up at almost every conference. Perhaps the GSO should take action to direct individual member services back to the groups where this tradition suggests it belongs.

THE CONCEPTS (THE WHAT?)

CONCEPT IV (Long Form): *Throughout our Conference structure, we ought to maintain at all responsible levels a traditional "Right of Participation," taking care that each classification or group of our world servants shall be allowed a voting representation in reasonable proportion to the responsibility that each must discharge.*

Concepts III, IV, and V are called the "A.A. Bill of Rights:" Right of Decision," "Right of Participation," and "Right of Appeal." The Concept IV principle of "Participation" provides that the Trustees, the Directors of our service corporations, (A.A. World Services, Inc. and The A.A. Grapevine, Inc.) together with the respective executive staffs, shall always be voting members of the General Service Conference itself. This "participating" method of doing business differs from institutional or governmental agencies wherein high-level people are set in authority, one over the other.

In order to provide a voting representation proportion

to their responsibility, the number of Delegates attending a Conference is always at least two-thirds of the total number of attendees.

As Bill W wrote "There is another good reason for 'participation,' and this one has to do with our spiritual needs. All of us deeply desire to *belong*. We want an A.A. relation of brotherly partnership. It is our shining ideal that the "spiritual corporation" of A.A. should never include any members who are regarded as "second class."

Your Group General Service Representative (GSR) has the "Right of Participation (Voting member) at District and Area meetings.

Refer to "The A.A. Service Manual for a complete explanation of the Twelve Concepts.

I am realizing the more I give freely of myself in Alcoholics Anonymous, the more I am given. As I sat in my 7:30am home group today a women walked in who is about two weeks sober. I greeted her and told her I was happy she was here. I invited her to go to breakfast with me, and she accepted. As we sat and talked we shared stories with each other about our addiction, and how it affected the people we loved. When we parted I knew today was the day I needed to set my Father free.



He passed away April 20, 2011 from cancer. I was 65 days sober, and I didn't have to drink. Alcoholics Anonymous showed up for me. I asked a women who I have grown very close to over the past 34 days since she came into the program if she would go somewhere with me after the noon meeting. Without thought, or asking what it was we were going to do, she said yes. We went to the Spruce Creek Park. It's an amazing creation of God. We walked through the woods to the bridge that expands over the marsh. She allowed me to tell her stories about my Father. The strength he gave me through his death. The miracle of his love I have rejected over the past 35 years. The trust he had in me to tell me he was scared to die, and the wisdom I had to tell him he will never be alone and it's going to be OK. We laughed, we prayed, we cried, and I let my Father go.

The sky was so blue, the sun was warm and strong, and the breeze was gentle on my skin. There were yellow butterflies everywhere. As my dad floated away he passed over a stick in the marsh. His ashes formed a heart on the other side. I asked my friend "Do you see that?" She said "I do." It was peaceful silent love from my Father.

I said to my sponsor a few days ago how grateful I am that people love me today, and she said to me "Susan, it's because you love people." As my friend and I walked back to our cars, I shared one last story with her. Two weeks after my Father passed away, I went to my weekly women's meeting. There was a memorial taking place in the church. As the meeting went on in the library, someone started playing Amazing Grace on the bag pipes. When I was taking care of my dad the last ten days, an AA woman who I love very much gave me a CD with the most beautiful version on Amazing Grace I had ever heard. I repeatedly listened to that song on my way to see him, and on my way home. It gave me strength to go on, and stay sober.

She sat with me in my car and listened to that CD with me today before she left. I say a lot that sobriety is the gift that keeps on giving, and today I experienced yet another moment that makes me so very grateful for the gift of sobriety. I know today only I can give that up. No one or nothing can take this from me. And if this is as good as it gets, it's good enough for me.
